DECLARATION OF KEVIN COPITHORNE

- 1. My name is Kevin Copithorne. I am a Canadian resident. In January 2018, my wife and I stayed in Miami Beach for three days before a scheduled cruise. I have visited Miami before on work trips, but this was my first time staying in Miami Beach for vacation. We stayed north of Ocean Drive.
- 2. One afternoon my wife and I were walking along Ocean Drive. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon which we figured was happy hour. We decided to stop for a drink at the Colony Hotel located at 736 Ocean Drive because we saw a sign outside advertising a "two-for-one" deal and we were invited in by the host standing outside. We thought it sounded nice and the host showed us to a table.
- 3. We ordered two sangrias, which we figured would be a reasonable deal given the "two-for-one" special that was advertised. There were no prices listed on the menu. Given that it was sangria and did not contain a lot of alcohol, I did not think it would be too expensive.
- 4. When we got our bill, the two sangrias totaled \$75. This would mean that if this was truly a "two-for-one" deal, each sangria would have cost \$75 and our total would have been \$150. I thought this was ridiculous.
- 5. I vigorously complained to the waiter, the supervisor, and finally the owner. I did not yell, but it was an audible interaction. After about 30 minutes of arguing with them, I was told by the owner that "it is what it is." Rather than get the police involved, I decided to let it be and follow up with my complaint afterward. We paid and left.
- 6. After this awful experience, I followed up with the Miami Beach Chamber of Commerce. The City of Miami Beach got back to me about this incident and I was told that they investigated the price gouging and found that the Colony Hotel was in violation of the code. I felt vindicated by this and thought the city reacted positively.

7. This experience soured my stay in Miami Beach, which was otherwise pleasant. I have traveled around the world and know that certain countries have reputations for scamming visitors. Never would I imagine that this would happen in the United States.
