July 17, 2020 at 9:00 a.m.

The July 17, 2020 City of Miami Beach Special Commission Meeting will be held as a Virtual Meeting with the Mayor, Commissioners, and City staff participating through video conferencing.

- **How to observe the Virtual Special Commission Meeting:**

The Virtual Special Commission Meeting will be broadcast live on Miami Beach TV (MBTV), viewable on the City's website at <https://www.miamibeachfl.gov/government/mbtv/>, as well as on Atlantic Broadband Cable channel 660, AT&T U-verse channel 99, Hotwire Communications channel 395, and ROKU device on PEG.TV channel. Closed captioning displays of the audio portion of the Virtual Special Commission Meeting are available in English and Spanish on MBTV. The Virtual Special Commission Meeting will also be broadcast live on social media at [facebook.com/cityofmiamibeach](https://www.facebook.com/cityofmiamibeach).

- **How to submit written public comment before the Virtual Special Commission Meeting:**

The public may submit written comments by sending an email to CityClerk@miamibeachfl.gov by 5:00 p.m. the day before the Virtual Special Commission Meeting. Please identify the Agenda Item Number in the email subject line. Emails received will be forwarded to the Mayor and Commissioners and will be included as a part of the meeting record.

Please note that Governor DeSantis' Executive Order Number 20-69, as extended as extended by Executive Orders 20-121, 20-123, 20-139, and 20-150, suspended the requirement of Section 112.286, Florida Statutes, the Florida Sunshine Law, that a quorum must be present in person, and that a local government body meet at a specific public place. The Executive Orders also allow local government bodies to utilize communications media technology, such as telephonic and video conferencing for local government body meetings.
