SUBJECT: HPB20-0437, **2660 Collins Avenue**.

An application has been filed requesting a Certificate of Appropriateness for the installation of a generator at the northwest corner of the municipal surface parking lot.

## **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

Approval of the Certificate of Appropriateness with conditions.

## BACKGROUND

## THE PROJECT

The applicant has submitted plans entitled "Indian Creek Generator", as prepared by Craven Thompson and Associates, Inc., dated September 16, 2020.

## **COMPLIANCE WITH ZONING CODE**

A preliminary review of the project indicates that the application appears to be consistent with the City Code.

This shall not be considered final zoning review or approval. These and all zoning matters shall require final review and verification by the Zoning Administrator prior to the issuance of a Building Permit.

## CONSISTENCY WITH 2025 COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

A preliminary review of the project indicates that the use is **consistent** with the Future Land Use Map of the Comprehensive Plan.

## COMPLIANCE WITH SEA LEVEL RISE AND RESILIENCY REVIEW CRITERIA

Section 133-50(a) of the Land Development establishes review criteria for sea level rise and resiliency that must be considered as part of the review process for board orders. The following is an analysis of the request based upon these criteria:

- (1) A recycling or salvage plan for partial or total demolition shall be provided. **Not Applicable**

## **ANALYSIS**

The applicant is requesting approval for the installation of an emergency generator at the northwest corner of the existing P55 municipal parking lot. The generator will supply emergency power to the pump station located at 32<sup>nd</sup> Street and Indian Creek Drive. In association with the generator installation, the applicant is proposing to introduce substantial landscaping to screen the equipment including low ground cover, medium height hedge material and 10 pigeon plum trees. Additionally, the generator will be wrapped with a natural landscape graphic to further conceal the equipment from public view.

#### UPDATE

At the January 12<sup>th</sup>, 2021 meeting, the Board discussed and continued the application to the February meeting to give the applicant additional time to address concerns expressed by several members of the Board. Potential modifications discussed included the removal of additional parking spaces to accommodate expanded walkways and public areas, the introduction of architectural screening, and amenities to support a transit stop.

Since the January meeting, staff has had discussions with the applicant to better understand the constraints of the site and determine the feasibility of modifications to address board comments. The following is a summary of the constraints associated with the modifications proposed by the board:

#### Removal of parking spaces to accommodate expanded walkways and public areas.

Given the significant lack of public parking facilities in the immediate area (between 24<sup>th</sup> Street and 42<sup>nd</sup> Street) any additional reduction in public parking within this neighborhood is not recommended as it would exacerbate existing shortfalls. Additionally, the addition of physical structures such as a loggia and expanded walkways is not recommended as these types of amenities are provided along the public Beachwalk to the east and will be available along the west side of Indian Creek Drive with the completion of the Indian Creek Greenway.

#### Introduction of architectural screening.

To effectively screen the generator, the height of architectural screening needed would significantly exceed the height of a typical fence and would require additional, substantial foundation work that is currently not budgeted. Moreover, with the dense landscaping proposed, the architectural screening would be obscured. Accordingly, such screening is not recommended.

#### Amenities to support a transit stop.

The locations of transit stops are at the sole discretion of Miami-Dade County and adding or relocating a transit stop at the subject location is not currently an option. However, multi-modal elements, such as bike racks, can be provided at the corner, and is recommended as part of the approval.

In summary, staff believes that the most appropriate option is the proposed dense landscape plan, with future enhancements such as the introduction of shade trees within the existing concrete median and street furniture such as bicycle facilities at the northwest corner of the property. Finally, staff would note that the project will enhance and improve current site conditions while increasing the resiliency of this area of the City. As such, staff recommends approval as noted below.

#### RECOMMENDATION

In view of the foregoing analysis, staff recommends the application be **approved** subject to the conditions enumerated in the attached draft Order.

The City of Miami Beach Historic Preservation Board makes the following FINDINGS OF FACT, based upon the evidence, information, testimony and materials presented at the public hearing and which are part of the record for this matter:

#### I. Certificate of Appropriateness

- A. The subject site is located within the Collins Waterfront Local Historic District.
- B. Based on the plans and documents submitted with the application, testimony and information provided by the applicant, and the reasons set forth in the Planning Department Staff Report, the project as submitted:
  - 1. Is consistent with Sea Level Rise and Resiliency Review Criteria in Section 133-50(a) of the Miami Beach Code.
  - 2. Is consistent with the Certificate of Appropriateness Criteria in Section 118-564(a)(1) of the Miami Beach Code.
  - 3. Is consistent with Certificate of Appropriateness Criteria in Section 118-564(a)(2) of the Miami Beach Code.
  - 4. Is consistent with Certificate of Appropriateness Criteria in Section 118-564(a)(3) of the Miami Beach Code.
- C. The project would remain consistent with the criteria and requirements of section 118-564 and 133-50(a) if the following conditions are met:
  - 1. Revised elevation, site plan and floor plan drawings shall be submitted and, at a minimum, such drawings shall incorporate the following:

- a. The generator shall be relocated in the event a new development project is approved for the site, subject to approval by the City Commission.
- b. The applicant shall explore the introduction of City standard bicycle racks at the northwest corner of the property.
- c. Final details of the proposed generator installation shall be submitted, in a manner to be reviewed and approved by staff consistent with the Certificate of Appropriateness Criteria and/or the directions from the Board. The generator shall be wrapped with a natural landscape image.
- 2. A revised landscape plan, prepared by a Professional Landscape Architect, registered in the State of Florida, and corresponding site plan, shall be submitted to and approved by staff. The species type, quantity, dimensions, spacing, location and overall height of all plant material shall be clearly delineated and subject to the review and approval of staff and shall include the following:
  - a. The applicant has proffered to introduce shade trees within the center median of the parking lot as part of the Indian Creek Greenway project, subject to the review and approval of CIP, Planning and Urban Forestry.

In accordance with Section 118-537, the applicant, the owner(s) of the subject property, the City Manager, Miami Design Preservation League, Dade Heritage Trust, or an affected person may appeal the Board's decision on a Certificate of Appropriateness to a special master appointed by the City Commission.

- II. Variance(s)
  - A. No variances have been requested as part of this application.

The decision of the Board regarding variances shall be final and there shall be no further review thereof except by resort to a court of competent jurisdiction by petition for writ of certiorari.

- III. General Terms and Conditions applying to both 'I. *Certificate of Appropriateness'* and 'II. *Variances'* noted above.
  - A. The applicant agrees and shall be required to provide access to areas subject to this approval (not including private residences or hotel rooms) for inspection by the City (i.e.: Planning, Code Compliance, Building Department, Fire Safety), to ensure compliance with the plans approved by the Board and conditions of this order.
  - B. The relocation of any tree shall be subject to the approval of the Environment & Sustainability Director and/or Urban Forester, as applicable.
  - C. All applicable FPL transformers or vault rooms and backflow prevention devices shall be located within the building envelope with the exception of the valve (PIV) which may be visible and accessible from the street.

- D. The issuance of a building permit is contingent upon meeting Public School Concurrency requirements, if applicable. Applicant shall obtain a valid School Concurrency Determination Certificate (Certificate) issued by the Miami-Dade County Public Schools. The Certificate shall state the number of seats reserved at each school level. In the event sufficient seats are not available, a proportionate share mitigation plan shall be incorporated into a tri-party development agreement and duly executed. No building permit may be issued unless and until the applicant obtains a written finding from Miami-Dade County Public Schools that the applicant has satisfied school concurrency.
- E. Where one or more parcels are unified for a single development, the property owner shall execute and record a unity of title or a covenant in lieu of unity of title, as may be applicable, in a form acceptable to the City Attorney.
- F. A copy of all pages of the recorded Final Order shall be scanned into the plans submitted for building permit and shall be located immediately after the front cover page of the permit plans.
- G. The Final Order shall be recorded in the Public Records of Miami-Dade County, prior to the issuance of a Building Permit.
- H. Satisfaction of all conditions is required for the Planning Department to give its approval on a Certificate of Occupancy; a Temporary Certificate of Occupancy or Partial Certificate of Occupancy may also be conditionally granted Planning Departmental approval.
- The Final Order is not severable, and if any provision or condition hereof is held void or unconstitutional in a final decision by a court of competent jurisdiction, the order shall be returned to the Board for reconsideration as to whether the order meets the criteria for approval absent the stricken provision or condition, and/or it is appropriate to modify the remaining conditions or impose new conditions.
- J. The conditions of approval herein are binding on the applicant, the property's owners, operators, and all successors in interest and assigns.
- K. Nothing in this order authorizes a violation of the City Code or other applicable law, nor allows a relaxation of any requirement or standard set forth in the City Code.
- L. Upon the issuance of a final Certificate of Occupancy or Certificate of Completion, as applicable, the project approved herein shall be maintained in accordance with the plans approved by the board and shall be subject to all conditions of approval herein, unless otherwise modified by the Board. Failure to maintain shall result in the issuance of a Code Compliance citation, and continued failure to comply may result in revocation of the Certificate of Occupancy, Completion and Business Tax Receipt.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED, based upon the foregoing findings of fact, the evidence, information, testimony and materials presented at the public hearing, which are part of the record for this matter, and the staff report and analysis, which are adopted herein, including the staff recommendations, which were amended and adopted by the Board, that the application is

GRANTED for the above-referenced project subject to those certain conditions specified in Paragraph I, II,III of the Findings of Fact, to which the applicant has agreed.

PROVIDED, the applicant shall build substantially in accordance with the plans entitled "Indian Creek Generator", as prepared by Craven Thompson and Associates, Inc., dated September 16, 2020, as approved by the Historic Preservation Board, as determined by staff.

When requesting a building permit, the plans submitted to the Building Department for permit shall be consistent with the plans approved by the Board, modified in accordance with the conditions set forth in this Order. No building permit may be issued unless and until all conditions of approval that must be satisfied prior to permit issuance, as set forth in this Order, have been met.

The issuance of the approval does not relieve the applicant from obtaining all other required Municipal, County and/or State reviews and permits, including final zoning approval. If adequate handicapped access is not provided on the Board-approved plans, this approval does not mean that such handicapped access is not required. When requesting a building permit, the plans submitted to the Building Department for permit shall be consistent with the plans approved by the Board, modified in accordance with the conditions set forth in this Order.

If the Full Building Permit for the project is not issued within eighteen (18) months of the meeting date at which the original approval was granted, the application will expire and become null and void, unless the applicant makes an application to the Board for an extension of time, in accordance with the requirements and procedures of Chapter 118 of the City Code; the granting of any such extension of time shall be at the discretion of the Board. If the Full Building Permit for the project should expire for any reason (including but not limited to construction not commencing and continuing, with required inspections, in accordance with the applicable Building Code), the application will expire and become null and void.

In accordance with Chapter 118 of the City Code, the violation of any conditions and safeguards that are a part of this Order shall be deemed a violation of the land development regulations of the City Code. Failure to comply with this **Order** shall subject the application to Chapter 118 of the City Code, for revocation or modification of the application.
