A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF MIAMI BEACH, FLORIDA CALLING FOR A NOVEMBER 8, 2022 CITY OF MIAMI BEACH SPECIAL ELECTION, FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUBMITTING TO THE ELECTORATE OF THE CITY OF MIAMI BEACH A QUESTION ASKING WHETHER CITY SHALL INCREASE MAXIMUM FAR FROM 2.0 TO 2.75 IN RPS4 DISTRICT IN SOUTH OF FIFTH NEIGHBORHOOD AS AN INCENTIVE FOR THE CONVERSION OF EXISTING HOTEL PROPERTIES INTO RESIDENTIAL USE, IF THE PROPERTY OWNER RECORDS A COVENANT

PROHIBITING SHORT-TERM RENTALS ON THE PROPERTY.

Pursuant to the request of City Commissioner Alex Fernandez, the attached Resolution has been prepared calling for a City of Miami Beach Special Election to be held on November 8, 2022 for the purpose of submitting to the City's voters the following question:

RPS4 District – South of Fifth Street FAR Incentive to Convert Existing Hotels Into Residential Use

City Charter requires voter approval before increasing a property's floor area ratio ("FAR") (City's method of regulating building size).

The RPS4 district lies within the South of Fifth Neighborhood, which is predominantly residential.

Shall City increase maximum FAR from 2.0 to 2.75 in RPS4 District as an incentive for the conversion of existing hotel properties into residential use, if the property owner records a covenant prohibiting short-term rentals on the property?

Section 1.03(c) of the City Charter provides in pertinent part that the "floor area ratio of any property or street end within the City of Miami Beach shall not be increased by zoning, transfer, or any other means from its current zoned floor area ratio as it exists on the date of adoption of this Charter Amendment [November 7, 2001] ... unless any such increase in zoned floor area ratio for any such property shall first be approved by a vote of the electors of the City of Miami Beach."

Commission Memorandum – FAR Incentive South of 5th St. - Conversion of Hotel to Residential July 20, 2022

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Currently, the maximum zoned floor area ratio ("FAR") is 2.0 in the RPS-4 Residential performance standard, high density district, which is located in the South of Fifth Street neighborhood. This ballot question asks whether the City shall increase the maximum FAR in the RPS-4 district from 2.0 to 2.75 as an incentive for the conversion of existing hotel properties into residential use. In order to be eligible for the voluntary FAR incentive, the property owner would first be required to record a covenant agreeing to prohibit short-term rentals on the property.

The purpose of this measure is to incentivize the redevelopment of hotels within the RPS-4 zoning district, such as the Marriott Stanton at 161 Ocean Drive, into residential properties. The replacement of hotels with residential development would reduce the impacts of transient uses in the South of Fifth neighborhood, which is primarily residential.

Because the measure contemplates an increase in zoned FAR, the approval of the City's voters is required pursuant to Sec. 1.03(c) of the City Charter. A draft of the proposed Ordinance is attached to this memorandum.

The Miami-Dade County Elections Department has informed the City Clerk that the City's Resolution calling a November 8, 2022 Special Election must be provided to the County Elections Department by July 29, 2022. Accordingly, it should be noted that the proposed measure may be considered by the City Commission either at the July 20, 2022 City Commission meeting or, at the latest, the Special Meeting scheduled for July 25, 2022.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

The Miami-Dade County Elections Department has provided the City Clerk with an estimate of approximately \$28,559.85 (Cost Estimate for One Page Ballot) and \$56,217.70 (Cost Estimate in the Scenario Multiple Questions Triggers an Additional Page) to conduct the November 8, 2022 Special Election, which includes the costs associated with 14 days of Early Voting. (See Department of Election Estimates.) Additionally, the City will incur approximately \$42,000 in legally mandated advertisements, required by the Florida Statutes and the City Code, to notice this Special Election.
