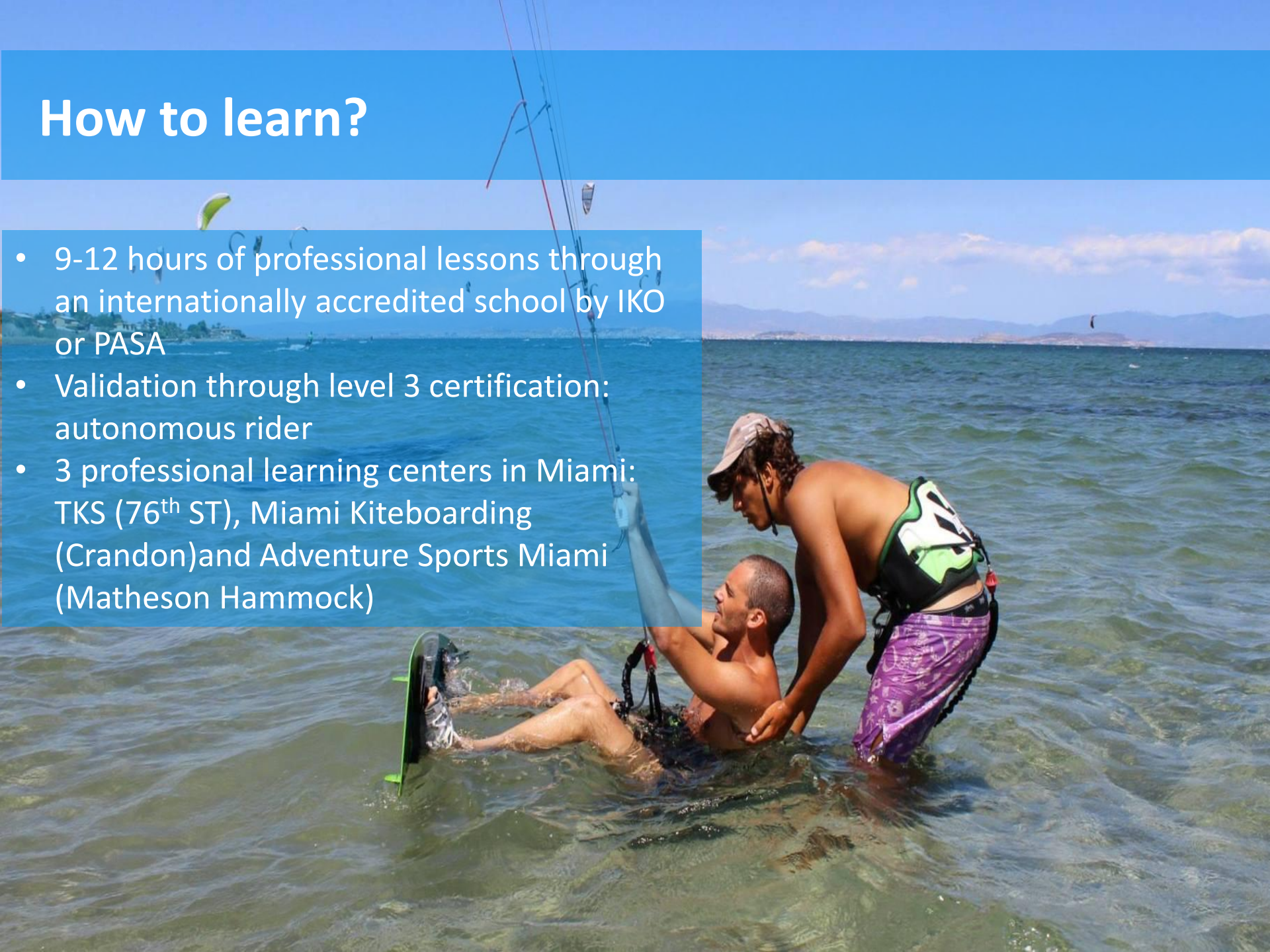
How does it work?

- Kite pulls rider perpendicular to the wind
- Rider rides upwind, away from the beach
- Miami main wind season: October-April
- Miami Beach rideable wind directions: North, East and South
- Wind strength needed: 10+ mph (foilboard), 15+ mph (traditional kiteboard)



How to learn?

- 9-12 hours of professional lessons through an internationally accredited school by IKO or PASA
- Validation through level 3 certification: autonomous rider
- 3 professional learning centers in Miami: TKS (76th ST), Miami Kiteboarding (Crandon) and Adventure Sports Miami (Matheson Hammock)

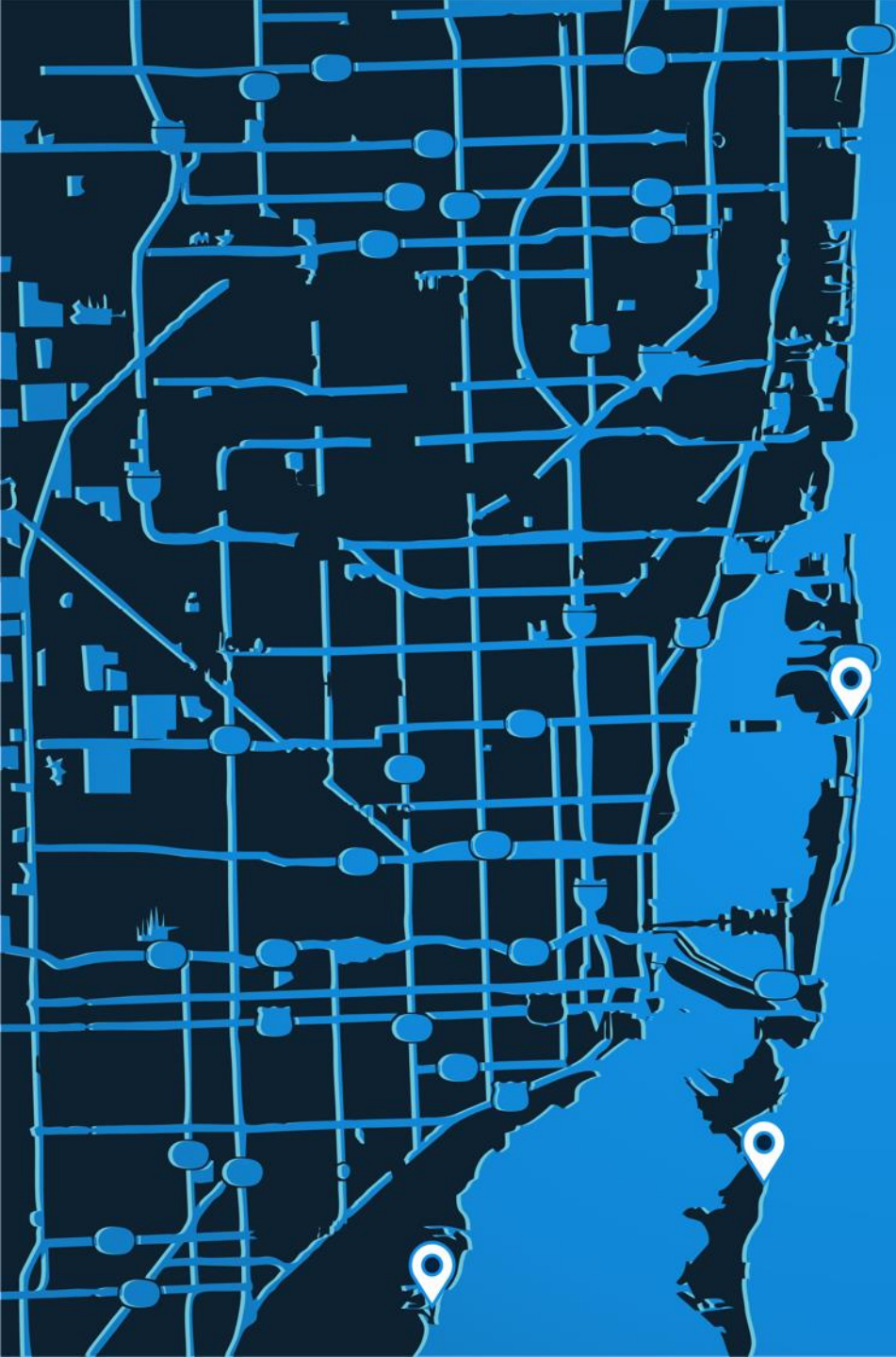
