SUBJECT: REPORT OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD/COMMUNITY AFFAIRS COMMITTEE (NCAC)
MEETING ON WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 24, 2018

A meeting of the Neighborhood/Community Affairs Committee (the "Committee") was held on Friday, January 28, 2019 at 1:00 p.m. in the Commission Chambers, 3rd Floor of City Hall. Commissioners in attendance: Micky Steinberg, Michael Góngora, Joy Malakoff, John Elizabeth Aleman and Mark Samuelian. Members from the Administration and the public were also in attendance.

The meeting started at 1:01 pm.

OLD BUSINESS

1. DISCUSSION REGARDING CRIME IN MIAMI BEACH

February 14, 2018 - R9 X
Sponsored by Commissioner Góngora
Police

ACTION

Major Paul Acosta, City of Miami Beach Patrol Operations Commander, briefed the Committee about information regarding the review of the Faena District as it pertains to calls for service crime from the ocean to the Indian Creek waterway. Commissioner Michael Góngora asked about the staff changes taking place on the beachwalk and the boardwalk and the impact it would have on current police staff. Major Acosta stated that there are no staff changes, the two officers assigned to that area were temporary assignments. Currently, the two assigned positions are open positions and permanent candidates being interviewed. The two police officers who occupy the boardwalk and beachwalk locations are among the candidates that will be interviewed for the full-time assignment of those respective positions.

Commissioner Joy Malakoff asked Major Acosta if the Miami Beach Police Department was fully staffed and if not, what steps and procedures the Department is doing to staff those positions. Major Acosta stated that the Police Department is currently budgeted for

candidates to fill the open positions. Major Acosta stated they hired four certified police officers with the goal to get certified police officers on the street right away and also send police to the police academy for certification in the coming months.

Commissioner Góngora asked about the projected date when the boardwalk will, come down and requested an LTC with an update on that matter.

Commissioner John Elizabeth Alemán posed the question of what the City's Police Department is doing in preparation of the Super Bowl LV festivities coming to the South Florida area in January of 2020 per homeland security issues and human trafficking issues.

Rick Clements, City of Miami Beach Deputy Police Chief, stated that there was an LTC coming out regarding the personnel that will be traveling to the City of Atlanta, specifically to observe what Atlanta is doing to prepare for the Super Bowl. Major Acosta and Deputy Clements stated they are both apart of Super Bowl LV committees that have been divided into sub-committees to address all the issues that could arise in South Florida including traffic and logistics

Commissioner John Elizabeth Alemán proposed that the City do regular updates for Code Enforcement on a quarterly basis since another driver of emails, from constituents, are code enforcements. Commissioner Góngora stated that he will co-sponsor the item as a referral on a quarterly basis.

DIRECTION: Deferred to the March 19, 2019 NCAC meeting addressing the issue of criminal activity specifically within the 31st street area (Greenbrier Hotel/Faena District specifically) and a report and recommendations for the municipal prosecutor and a super bowl update.

2. DISCUSSION REGARDING NAMING FOR THE NEW NORTHERN CONVENTION CENTER PARK AND THE MAIN CONVENTION CENTER PARK

ACTION

Matt Kenny introduced himself as the Director of Tourism and Culture. Heather Shaw, Assistant Director, Tourism and Culture presented the naming of the Miami Beach Convention Center parks. Heather stated that in December they were presenting names for the North Park and the Main Convention Center Park/P-Lot area. At the last Committee meeting, Tourism and Culture (formerly Tourism, Culture and Economic Development) was asked to present additional names. Heather stated that the Administration reached out to West 8, the landscape architects for the parks, and found additional names.

Commissioner Michael Góngora suggested that the two potential park names that were options for him for the North Convention Center Park were *Artscape Park* and *Collins Canal Park* and he was open to suggestions from the Committee. Commissioner Joy Malakoff stated that North Park was positioned along the Collins Canal, and that the Carl Fisher Clubhouse, within the North Park is being renovated. Commissioner Malakoff suggested that the North Park should be named *Carl Fisher Park*. Commissioner Góngora seconded the name of Carl Fisher Park.

Commissioner Góngora asked the Committee about their opinions to allow a city-wide poll to decide the naming of the Main Convention Center Park. Commissioner Malakoff suggested that the P-Lot park should be named *Centennial Park*. Kathie Brooks, Assistant City Manager, asked Deborah Turner, Deputy Assistant City Attorney, if a referendum would be needed and if a referendum was needed could there be any options to which the name can be modified such as *City Center Centennial Park that would not require a referendum*. Deborah stated that technically *Centennial* did not meet the definition of the exceptions to the referendum but further due diligence would be needed to determine whether or not it would be acceptable to combine the name with location.

Commissioner Michael Góngora suggested reaching out to the public on the proposed names. Commissioner Steinberg directed Tonya Daniels, Director of Marketing and Communications, to figure out the best way to go forward with the idea on how to reach the public with the proposed names. Assistant City Manager Kathie Brooks stated that a motion would be needed to send to City Commission to adopt that motion and asked that the item return to the April Committee meeting. Ms. Brooks also stated that the Administration refers with legal first as to which names would not need to go to referendum.

Commissioner John Elizabeth Alemán stated that she recalled that the main park contained prevalent species of flowering trees that could also be placed on the list of potential names for that park.

VOTE BY ACCLAMATION: A recommendation to the City Commission that the North Convention Center Park to be named *Carl Fisher Park*. Marketing Communication department to develop a plan on how to survey/obtain input from the residents of the City of Miami Beach with the proposed names, including but not limited to *Mosaic Park, Convention Center Park, Canopy Park, Centennial Park, Mahogany Park, and any other park name related to prevalent flowering species* and return with the results of the community input to the Committee in April.

3. DISCUSSION REGARDING THE POSSIBILITY OF INSTALLING A TURNING LANE WHEN YOU ARE DRIVING EAST ON I-195 HEADING ONTO 41ST STREET AND TURNING SOUTH ON ALTON ROAD

ACTION

Commissioner Góngora stated that this item was brought to his attention primarily from parents of St. Patrick School students who are having difficulty dropping their kids off to school. Commissioner Góngora recommend that the item be deferred to March based on the premise that FDOT (Florida Department of Transportation) is not recommending a turning lane at the time. Commissioner Góngora stated that St. Patrick School administration is currently doing a petition and when that petition is received it be forwarded, not only to the City Commission members but also to FDOT and the City of Miami Beach State representative and State Senator and report back to the Committee in March. Assistant City Manager Kathie Brooks stated that preparing a resolution from the Commission to go along with the petition from St. Patrick School should be sent to the representatives. Commissioner Góngora stated that he would like to see the petition first to monitor what the language of the petition may say than place it on the agenda for the Commission to discuss it.

DIRECTION: Item deferred to the March 19, 2019 Neighborhoods Community Affairs Committee meeting pending petition results from St. Patrick School.

4. DISCUSSION REGARDING UNDERGROUNDING FOR NORTH BAY ROAD AND ALTON ROAD

ACTION

Roy Coley, Public Works Director stated that the item is to update the Committee on the direction they provided staff to take a more leadership role in undergrounding within North Bay Road. Roy stated that the direction from the Committee was to look at facilitating undergrounding in the North Bay Road area. Mr. Coley stated that the City Clerk and his staff began the process with a survey. Commissioner Aleman stated that the survey tabulation received did reach the threshold needed of 60% and asked Nick Kallergis, Senior Assistant City Attorney, what the next steps that need to take place for the future of undergrounding on North Bay Road. Nick Kallergis stated that historically the homeowners within a community would circulate petitions, and once those signatures reach the signature threshold of 70-80%, the City Commission would go forward and direct staff to seek a rough estimate from the utility companies. Prior to getting binding estimates from utility companies certain steps needed to be funded so FPL can go out and determine the cost the project would be. Nick Kallergis stated that based on his research the only steps that the City would change would be instead of the HOA circulating the petition, the City of Miami Beach would circulate the petition.

Commissioner Góngora stated that he needed clarification upon reading the resolution and report about the specific quorum of the report. Rafael E. Granado, City Clerk, clarified the responses by stating that the voter turnout, which is based off of the total.

Commissioner Aleman asked if there was a decision to proceed with the special election and have a binding vote, what would the steps be and how much would it cost the city. Mr. Kallergis stated that the first steps would be whatever studies are required by the utility company, so the utility company can provide the estimate. Rafael stated that the cost of the election would be close to \$16,000 to \$18,000 and cost would be predicated on the City's need to treat this election as a standard citywide election in terms of advertisement in Spanish and English.

Commissioner Aleman asked Roy Coley the cost to prepare for the binding estimates that would go on to the special election. Roy stated that in the past the process was City staff would be assigned with gathering approximate cost. Once those cost were gathered they would be reviewed by the Homeowners Association that brought forth the petition to acquiesce that the cost is as expected than got to the Committee for approval.

Commissioner Aleman asked what the cost would be to get a binding estimate to put on the special election ballot. Roy stated that an expenditure would have to be authorized to give to FPL and they would tell us the exact cost.

Commissioner Aleman stated that the next time the Committee hears about this item we should know how much it cost to create the binding estimate - which is what the HOA would have to partner on to pay for to conduct the special election. Commissioner Aleman stated that the election will be conducted by the clerk office as an election.

MOTION: Commission Joy Malakoff made a motion to proceed with the next steps for creating a district and obtaining the binding estimates for the utilities. Commissioner Gongora seconded the motion.

ACTION

Commissioner Samuelian briefed the Committee on this item which is regarding how to engage the community throughout the City of Miami Beach. Tonya Daniels, Director of Marketing and Communications, stated that her department and Commissioner Samuelian have been working closely together on how the residents of the City of Miami Beach can connect with the City and learn about the informative activities taking place.

Ms. Daniels presented an engagement toolbox platform which is a one-stop-shop for all of the different channels to get connected to City.

Tonya presented the electronic town hall platform and shared that the town hall format is an idea which began from a recommendation from one of the members of the Neighborhoods Community Affairs Committee to do the electronic town hall meetings in conjunction with City Magazine. Tonya stated that the City Magazine comes out quarterly and the next one that comes out will be a special edition magazine about resiliency throughout the City of Miami Beach. City Manager Jimmy Morales suggested that for the first electronic town hall meeting with the City Manager, members of the Commission be included. Ms. Daniels proposed to the Committee that for the first town hall meeting the Mayor be included and for each one after that the Vice Mayor be included quarterly.

Rafael E. Granado, presented the e-comment item. Rafael stated that his staff met on January 25, 2019 with Novus and Granicus the e-comment section should go live by the March City Commission meeting. Mr. Granado stated that he will continue to work with Ms. Daniels on sending out the message to the constituents in Miami Beach that the informational resources are available.

Commissioner Samuelian stated that with the Committee's acceptance this item will move to the City Commission so that the e-comment and engagement tool box platforms will begin in March and the electronic town hall meetings will subsequently begin thereafter.

Commissioner Góngora stated that he gave the Administration the direction to look at any unnecessary legislation that was being carried on the books that weren't being reinforced. Nick Kallergis, Senior Assistant City Attorney, stated that he has been working closely with the Administration on reviewing code that are applicable to each department. Nick stated that the City Manager sent an email correspondence to all of the department directors asking for feedback and comment to what provisions could be removed as outdated legislation.

Nick stated that he sought direction of the Committee into whether the items come back separately, or should they come back together. Commissioner Góngora stated that he rather defer the item to as much time as needed by Mr. Kallergis. Commissioner Góngora stated that he would like to see the items altogether in some type of comprehensive list and deal with all the legislative items all at once.

DIRECTION: Deferred pending recommendations from departments. City Attorney to return with comprehensive multi-department recommendations to NCAC when ready.

ACTION

Commissioner Steinberg stated that Items 8, 9, and 10 will be heard together because they were all interrelated. Commissioner Góngora suggested that the Committee remove Item 10 and have the motions travel with items 8 and 9 since they are already on our agenda.

Cindy Casanova, Assistant Director, Parks and Recreation Department stated that direction was given to work with Bayshore HOA to gather naming suggestions and a potential naming process for the Par 3 Park. The item was then referred to the Parks and Recreational Facility Advisory Board ("PRFAB"). The Parks and Recreation staff also reached out to the Bayshore HOA and invited them to the December 11, 2018 PRFAB meeting to brainstorm with the Communication Department for possible park names. Subsequently, a motion to work with the Communications Department to develop a citywide public outreach campaign for naming recommendations including a commentary regarding how the name was derived. Furthermore, the outreach should include video presentation, provided by the architects for the Par 3 park, and description the area, neighborhood, municipal history and special features of the park.

Commissioner Góngora suggested that the park be named *Bayshore Park*. Commissioner Malakoff stated that she had no problem with *Bayshore Park* but also gave a suggestion of *Banyan Park*. Commissioner Samuelian stated that he is in support with Commissioner Góngora to name the park *Bayshore Park*. Commissioner Alemán stated that both were beautiful names

but asked if there were any concerns stated that *Banyan Park* may have an issue with a referendum because it does not fit within the four corners of the exemption for a referendum. Commissioner Steinberg stated that she believes *Bayshore Park* would be a good fit for the park.

MOTION: Commissioner Góngora made a motion to name the Par 3 Park, *Bayshore Park*. Commissioner Malakoff seconded the motion.

Cindy Casanova, Assistant Director, Parks and Recreation Department stated that the PRFAB recommended that we find a plaque, park or bench (some sort of permanent feature) that could be incorporated into the interior portion of the park. Cindy stated that the Administration's contacted Jorge Esposito's family for any suggestions. Ms. Casanova stated that their preference was to name the new formed dog area after Jorge Esposito. Commissioner Góngora stated that he suggests the area be *Esposito Park*.

ACTION

Dr. Leslie Rosenfeld, Chief Learning Development Officer, stated that after meeting with the LGBTQ committee, their suggestions were incorporated for on line diversity training. In addition, Dr. Rosenfeld stated that the Committee requested in-person diversity training. Dr. Rosenfeld stated that the Administration identified staff that had great amount of interaction with the community. Dr. Rosenfeld stated that two suggestions were made. Option 1: to look to see if the City could hire a temporary employee to develop an in-house diversity training course at a cost of \$6,800. Option 2: work with a provider that has been used and provided excellent diversity training that focuses on those issues that the LGBTQ committee asked to be emphasized. Dr. Rosenfeld suggested that option 2 is the best option available based on the cost. Commissioner Malakoff asked for the cost for the provider. Dr. Rosenfeld stated that the cost was \$9,000 for 15 workshops and a class of 30 individuals per workshop.

MOTION: Commissioner Malakoff made a motion to proceed with option 2, working with a provider that has used and provided diversity training that focuses on issues relating to the LGBTQ community. Commissioner Gongora seconded the motion.

The City was very concerned with the number of senior members who had chosen not to evacuate from the City when the evacuation order was issued. The City recommended to the Home Owners Association, Condo Association and property owners that they be required to proactive reach out to their tenants to register in the Emergency Evacuation Program as part of the owners Business Tax Receipt ("BTR") process.

Maria stated that a significant amount of these property owners were confused by this process and thought that perhaps the registration process was a challenge to their Fair Housing status. Maria is looking to streamline the process by eliminating the portion that tied the BTR to notifying the tenants about Emergency Evacuation Program; instead replacing it with a

notification of correspondence to the Home Owners Association, Condo Association and property owners. Maria stated that that these changes would help streamline BTR process.
